Dear Friends

One of the things about going on holiday in the UK is that you can never be certain of the weather. And so our two weeks in the Highlands of Scotland were marked not so much by bright sunshine as by clouds and attempts to dodge the rain! Then again, you have to count your blessings - for one thing it kept the dreaded Highland Midge at bay; for another, Continental Europe was suffering from the sort of heatwave that meant most people were taking refuge anywhere with air conditioning.....

It wasn't all rain of course, and it didn't stop us getting out and doing some walking; and on the days that were clearer we were confronted with seemingly endless vistas of high rocky peaks, lochs, and hills. We're used to the Lake District - but when we drove through the edges of it on the motorway on the way home, the comparison was striking - in comparison to Glencoe, Fort William, or the scenic train trip to Mallaig, it seemed the hills and mountains were somehow diminished - smaller and more tame. Scotland retains places that seem wilder, and are certainly more remote - had we waned we could have taken a boat trip to Inverarie, a mainland village so remote that it's either a boat trip or a twenty mile hike from the nearest road to reach it.....

More than ever I found my thoughts slipping to the words of Psalm 121 - which in the NIV starts, "I lift up my eyes to the mountains - where does my help come from? My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth." And yet again, I find myself astonished: that one so powerful that the fashioning of these peaks is the merest trifle, is nevertheless not only aware of us - of me - but wants to help and guide us, wants us to know Him, and calls us - every one of us - to be His people.

Shropshire Historic Churches Trust Ride & Stride Event

Once again, we have registered St John's with the SHCT fund raising event, **Ride & Stride** which this year takes place on **Saturday 9**th **September**, as part of Heritage Weekend.

This is a 3-pronged event.

- 1.) The church opens to visitors from 10am to 6pm with people manning it through the day. Visitors will come from across the county (and neighbouring ones) either walking, cycling, or riding horses or in a car, to as many churches/chapels as they can manage.
- 2.) Members of the church can Ride or Stride between as many churches/chapels as they are able in the time.
- 3.) Participants (Riders, Striders and church sitters etc.) obtain as much sponsorship as possible. It is possible to Gift Aid which is a valued extra.

As usual we are also planning to hold a coffee morning between 10am and 12 noon and hopefully a sponsored Hymn sing between 2 and 3pm. There will be a display of our heritage information and we are listed as a place to visit. As we could have more visitors than usual it would be helpful to have volunteers on a rota to steward the Church.

The organisers have now agreed that people **can use cars** to help them visit churches as the ones that are participating are often scattered. So, if you would like a morning or afternoon driving round beautiful Shropshire countryside, and raising funds from sponsorship at the same time, then this is your chance. After the event, all the Sponsor money is collected up and sent to the SHCT. The treasurer will then send 50% back to the nominated church/chapel ie. St. John's.

Tuesday Fellowship Group

This group usually meets on the first and third Tuesday in each month – although it will not be meeting on 5th September, so that people will be free to attend the Pray-Think- Act meeting.

On 19th September we shall be starting a new study on DVD called 'Sister Religions?' which discusses the relationship between Judaism, Christianity and Islam.

The study comprises a series of 6 interviews, each lasting about half an hour. Former bishop Michael Nazir-Ali introduces the subject by discussing the belief that Jews, Christians and Muslims share a common ancestry in Abraham. He also gives a brief overview of the stormy relationship between the three religions.

The next four sessions, led by Dr Mark Durie (an Australian theologian, pastor and researcher) approach the subject from slightly different angles and include the historic foundation of Islam, its colonial expansion, the classic Muslim response to non-Muslims and interfaith dialogue.

The final session features an interview with religious liberty advocate, Elizabeth Kendal. As the DVD progresses, viewers get a decent potted history of the relationship between Judaism, Christianity and Islam, which at times makes for sobering viewing. If you would like to have some understanding of the troubled times in which we live (possibly to inform your prayers?), then please think about joining us at Elizabeth's house in Queen's Road. We shall watch one interview each time and discuss it over coffee and biscuits.

The Miracle of Dunkirk

I saw this article in the online Prophecy Today magazine and thought I would share a summary of the article with you all:



"In July a new film about Dunkirk was released, to rave reviews. But as might have been expected, the film fails completely to do justice to what the whole nation agreed was a miraculous answer to prayer that saved Britain in one of her darkest hours.

The early days of the WWII threatened to bring the whole of Europe under the dark cloud of Nazi oppression. France had fallen to the rapidly advancing German Panzer divisions, leaving the British army stranded on the continent and desperate to return across the Channel to defend their homeland from what appeared to be inevitable invasion. It was a desperate situation and on 27 May 1940 the German High Command announced – "The British army is encircled and our troops are proceeding to its annihilation."

The dire plight of the situation had already been recognised in Britain. The day before the German announcement, Sunday 26 May, King George VI had called the nation to a day of prayer. In a stirring broadcast, the King had called the people of Britain and the Empire to commit their cause to God.

The whole nation responded. Large crowds went to Westminster Abbey. Unable to find seats, they stood outside listening to the service and joining in prayer. Churches across the land were filled and this day of prayer proved to be the first victory of the war. A great spiritual battle was fought in the heavenlies against the forces of darkness.

A series of miracles followed:

A spirit of confusion clouded the German High Command. Irrationally, Hitler ordered his generals to halt the advance towards the west coast of France. This gave the British army time to make their way to Dunkirk. A storm of extraordinary fury grounded the German Luftwaffe on 28 May, allowing the British forces to reach

the beaches.

A great calm followed which settled over the English Channel for several days with low cloud cover allowing the armada of little ships to cross the Channel and ferry the waiting soldiers from the beaches out to the Royal Navy warships for their return to Dover.

Amazingly 338,226 Allied soldiers were evacuated from Dunkirk in those few momentous days which would prove to be a turning point in world history. This was seen at the time as a direct response from God to the whole nation coming in humility before him in prayer. Winston Churchill, the British Prime Minister, told the nation that he believed this to be a miracle – an answer to prayer.

The safe return of so many men did not guarantee the survival of Britain. The army had to leave its weapons and equipment in France. Now it had to re-group, re-arm, and re-position itself to face the threat of imminent invasion. But the spirit of confusion in the German High Command continued to affect Hitler's judgment.

Amazingly, he did not follow across the Channel immediately after Dunkirk when Britain was at his mercy. He continued to hesitate throughout June to August 1940. This gave Britain a breathing space and an



opportunity to re-group and prepare for the coming battle.

It was at this point that Field Marshal Goering, head of Germany's Air Force, told his commanders that before Germany could invade Britain they had to destroy the Royal Air Force. On 30 August 1940, 800 enemy aircraft darkened the skies over southern Britain aiming to destroy the RAF's airfields. The Battle of Britain had begun!

The King again called for a National Day of Prayer on Sunday, 8 September 1940. This was to have been a day to give thanks to Almighty God for the miracle of Dunkirk. But the prayers of thanksgiving also turned to crying out to the Lord for the Battle of Britain in the air

This became the next miracle when RAF Spitfires and Hurricanes,

although greatly outnumbered, took a tremendous toll of the enemy bombers. By mid-September the Germans had sustained such heavy losses that they called off the mass attacks. On 17 September 1940, the German Supreme Command issued another order – "the invasion of England is postponed until further notice."

Once again Churchill addressed the nation and acknowledged the 'miracle of deliverance' in his famous speech, "Never in the field of human conflict has so much been owed by so many to so few". But everyone knew that it was not just 'the few' who had given the victory: it was God who had answered the prayers of the nation.

As a nation we have departed from our great biblical heritage and embraced the values of secular humanism – to our own destruction. This is why it is sad, but not surprising, that the new Dunkirk film focuses only on human bravery, failing to mention faith, prayer or even belief in the existence of God.

If we try to erase God from the testament of Britain's history, we erase him from her present and future. Christians should recognise the true nature of this spiritual battle for the soul of the nation, whether it takes place in our Parliament or in our cinemas, but should also take heart that our God is a God who answers prayer.

If ever there were a time for Christians to come before God in prayer, confessing the nation's unfaithfulness and interceding for people to turn in repentance, it is surely today. If we were to put our trust in the Lord and call upon him to heal the land, he would undoubtedly answer prayer today as he has done in the past."

You see, I haven't had that flash of light, that pivotal moment when I saw the light and became a Christian. So what's wrong with me? I absolutely love the music in church – the old Methodist hymns move me. But I don't always understand the words to some of the old hymns – but I think the words of the modern songs (?) are very moving. and drinking Seven-Ups! I wasn't particularly interested in the girls and dancing, but I did like one girl. She had purple hair and when she "bopped" she held her short skirt down to hide her modesty. Her name was Sheila Brindley, and I am proud to say that after 52 years she is still my wife! The leader of the club was Jeff Oxborrow who was a local preacher. He gave me a bible when I left for College.

When we left Wolstanton we went to live in Elworth in Sandbach. We joined Elworth Parish church and here again I became involved with doing what I could to help the church. I was in the choir (I looked very nice in my cassock!) and helped out with the money. I went to Spring Harvest for the first time. Rev David Page taught me such a lot and we had many deep theological discussions.

When we came Whitchurch, we were in a kind of Spiritual Wilderness as we sought to join a church We enjoyed our time at Wem Baptist and we thought Pastor Phil Wright was a wonderful, inspiring preacher. We tried St Alkmunds (too formal) and the

Beacon (too happy clappy), and so eventually we returned to our roots, St John's Methodist Church in Whitchurch.

There are, of course many things that I don't understand. Why does our loving, caring God allow all the bad things to happen in our world? Famines, when the world has enough to eat? Wars? Evil people? Why are good people taken from us so young? My brother died when he was only 44. I was pretty angry with God about that as felt my faith tested.

As I approach my mid-seventies, I'm sure that my faith will be sorely tested. In the years to come. What will the Final Great Mystery be like at the end of my life? I'm quite naïve in my beliefs. I believe in Heaven (hopefully I'll go there!) and I'm really looking forward to looking to meeting all the wonderful friends I've known in this world again. Oh, the joy in meeting my Dad again! And Sheila's Dad! Wonderful people! Sheila says Heaven must be a very crowded place.

Janet challenged us to think about where we were in relation to our faith and the Boat – the Boat of life. Where indeed. I still don't know. I rather think I'm still well and truly still inside the boat, frightened to get out, clinging on with white knuckles. It's safe in the Boat. If I came out of the Boat I'm sure I would drown!


Heaven
