Message from the Manse

Dear Friends,



First of all this month, I'd like to say "Thank You" for all the support - financial and otherwise! for running in the Whitchurch 10K last month. With help from Mike Nimmo, who organised the sponsorship, we've raised about £250 which has been split between Church and Macmillan.

Currently my Facebook Profile Picture is the one taken of me by Briony as I ran past the church, clowning around slightly - then again, it was not that far into the race! I was wearing one of my older Clerical Shirts over my running top, complete with Clerical Collar; and it's amazing to reflect on the number of people I saw on the way round the town, and who saw me. I heard more than one cry of "Keep going Vicar", and even shouted back on occasion something along the lines of "Isn't it terrible when you're late for church!" In a small way, I was offering some Christian presence and witness at the event - one which brought hundreds onto the streets to take part, dozens to volunteer, and many more just to cheer on friends, relatives and neighbours.

I'm writing this just after returning from Erddig, where I was volunteering at the regular parkrun - a weekly 5km (3 mile) timed run. I didn't do that in my collar, but again - there were over 200 people there, and I've chatted to a few of them, and not hidden my faith while I was doing it. And many people in this church - and other churches - are also very generous with their time, not just inside church but outside it too.

It's important that we are involved, for a number of reasons. I know not everyone can be, but it's a good way of getting out into the community, in places where sometimes there are a lot of people who have little or nothing to do with church; and being open and honest (not pushy!) about out faith can lead to some interesting conversations. But we should also remember that those conversations are not one way. Do we see God at work in some of the things we do as vol-

-unteers outside the church? And what messages do we bring back to the church from those that we meet, or the things that we do? What needs does the community have that we can respond to, guided by the Holy Spirit? And that sort of thinking, as much as any other, is about mission: showing our world God's love, and inviting others to come and share in it.

CIRCUIT MEETING.

I attended the Circuit Meeting (with Maurice and Peter as visitors) on Wednesday 7th March 2018 at Ettiley Heath, near Sandbach. The agenda was very long. We also split up into Mission Areas for discussions.

As well as the usual business of staffing, finance & property, I have just picked out a few items that you may find relevant.

Barbridge & Chorlton Chapels sought permission to close.

Poole Chapel with the garden, received permission to be managed by the Circuit.

Sue Brownbill has retired as Circuit Administrator and has been replaced by Judith Bell.

Pat Maidment has again taken on the role of Circuit Steward.

Mrs Priaulx is to be a Connexional Champion and will endeavour to draw our churches' attention to the various Methodist Charities.

All donations to Methodist Charities are to be continued to be sent in via the Circuit.

Winterley loan of £20,700 to pay their V.A.T. on the improvements has been exchanged into a gift.

Deacon Jill Taylor has joined the Circuit Staff team on a part time basis and will serve the Wrenbury Mission area.

The discussion in Mission Areas was on two questions:-

What are your aspirations for your Church and Mission Area?

What resources do you need to make this happen?

The questions would have been useful to discuss with all of you. If Maurice & Peter had not attended the meeting as visitors and Rob Weir had chosen to go with the Cheshire Hills Mission Area, I would have been having the discussion on my own, as none of the appointed Reps were able to attend. I was present as a member of Synod and not as a representative of St. John's.

Steward's Letter

Dear All,



On Sunday May 6th at our chapel AGM I expect my election to the position of Senior Steward to be confirmed. I am being elected unopposed and still have not been informed about the salary I will receive.

The idea of being Chief Steward fills me with both excitement and much terrification, in equal measure. I consider it to be a great honour and with your support I will do my best to do a good job. If I get it wrong please do not be afraid to let me have your opinion. You can send me an e-mail or better still pick up the phone – landline or mobile and we can discuss any issues. I do not use FaceBook because they know more about me than I do and the same applies to you.

For some time I have been asking 'where is the wind going?' When the church door opens as the congregation arrive for morning services, the heavy curtains blow into the horizontal position. One day, Peter and I were preparing to fit a new LED light over the central arch. Peter went up the ladder, and my job was to make sure the ladder did not fall. As we did the job I was wondering if our insurance policy covered us for doing 'in house', 'do-it-ourselves' repairs. I think it is easier to do it than to hold events to raise the funds to pay somebody else to do it.

Returning to the job we were doing – on reaching the parapet, Peter could see through a ½" gap in to the car park! The gap ran from the tower wall all the way to the

archway over the music group area. It must have been like that since the chapel was built, and in all that time not one of the many electricians who have been up there have told any of the chapel members about the gap under the roof. The money that has been wasted on heating the church over the years does not bear thinking about! A gap of that magnitude is like leaving your windows open on your home on a frosty winter's night. We have made a temporary fix, and can make a permanent repair when we have a new roof fitted in Phase 3 of our refurbishment plans.

Anyway, going back to the LED light being fitted – this is replacing the old corroded unit which has been using 400 watts of electricity. The new unit uses only 30 watts with no loss of light at a cost of £24.99 each. If everybody is happy with them, the saving in power is huge, approximately a 90% reduction in power requirement.

Phase 1 of our building project is making good progress, albeit much slower than I would like, but we will get there! On April 21st there was some good news – Methodist Insurance Fund has granted us £15,000 to help us top up our Refurbishment Fund. We are still working on some of the finer details of the plan. As it is at the moment we will lose some car park spaces. I would also be in favour of inner and outer glass doors to the Long Room, with an imprint of the original blacksmith-made hinges of the current door etched on to the glass, so retaining some of the old door's appearance.

Spring is here, but no swallows – maybe they know something about the weather we don't.

The starlings have gone back to Russia, and the rain is cleaning up the mess they made in parts of the town. Milk production will return to normal. In Tilstock we have 27 resident starlings. Is there a connection between the word 'starling' and the Russian tyrant Stalin?

And finally, a funny thing happened while I was 'cobwebbing' in the Long Room. Imagine my surprise when a table-tennis ball fell from the rafters! Does that mean the cobweb brush has not been up there since, or is it our new design of brush that gets in the places the old brush won't reach? Brian Faulkner said it is 40 years since table-tennis was played in the Long Room!

Can we measure the success of 'Sunday morning coffee' by the amount of milk we use – 4 pints!

1. Stewards Report—Mike Nimmo

The stewards have continued to support Rob in his ministry & met with him on a number of occasions. We recognised that Rob's ministry was to 3 Churches and not St John's alone. We therefore held one joint stewards meeting with all 3 groups of stewards. This was particularly successful in a number of ways not least recognising that Rob would be under pressure during the major festivals and we might not always have him taking , for example, our Easter Sunday service.

One particular action was the flyer to new homes which is working well. We might even consider expanding our coverage. Rob Hewson has had health problems throughout the year and had a "sabbatical" for a period but the remaining 4 stewards coped well. I have now finished my stint as Senior Steward and have been ably supported by the team. I have been succeeded by Maurice. We are seeking an addition to the team and would welcome anyone to volunteer.

2. Property & Finance Report—Peter Shingler

The committee met 3 times during past year. We have spent £6487.27p on maintaining, decorating & repairing faults with the building & equipment. Electrical & gas safety test have been carried out. Thanks to Lynne Fowler for her work testing all our portable appliances. The Guild room has been completely redecorated, thanks to the working party who spent around 300 worker-hours on the project.

We have received a good Quinquennial building inspection report, stating that the building is in better condition than 5 years ago. Once again thanks to all those who have made this possible. There is still work to do but nothing that is urgent.

3. Refurbishment Report—Jim Walwyn

We have received a donation of £70, 000 from the Circuit, and have made several applications for more funds from various organisations. We should have enough money to proceed very shortly.

Our plans have been approved by Shropshire Council and the work is being put out to tender. It is hoped that building will start at the end of July.

As well as the ramp, the plans include changes to the entrance to the church and a doorway joining the church to the back rooms to improve access.

5. Family Committee Report—Dorothy Faulkner

The Family Committee was set up over 30 years ago in the 1980s, to try and ensure that at times during the year the Church Family meets together, not only in worship but socially.

The Church and the Family Committee has evolved over the years and the Committee were much more active then than we are now!

The Committee comprises of the original members of Sue Davies, Jane Cliffe (who is our Treasurer) and Dorothy Faulkner (Secretary). Various other people have served on the Committee but the present members are Nancy Millington and Sheila Latham. Joan Davidson recently resigned and we thank her for all her work.

We organise the 4 events that take place in the Church calendar:

Easter Breakfast - 26 people sat down for breakfast this year. This was the highest number that we have had for years, as the Easter Breakfast has been the least popular of our meals.

<u>Chapel Anniversary Sunday Lunch</u> – held only two weeks ago. Numbers were down this year with only 29 people staying for lunch. People who usually come had various other commitments.

<u>Harvest Supper</u> – 2017. Numbers for this were down, too, at 33 people coming to the supper. The previous year we had an amazing 49 people!

<u>Christmas Party</u> - 2017. For the first time that the 'old – timers' can remember, we had to cancel the Christmas Party due to the heavy snow. So instead we had a New Year's Party on the 7th January. Despite the fact that we had missed Father Christmas calling on us, 42 people enjoyed the party. The Committee's thanks, as always, go to Vic Trigg for his contribution.

The Committee members give a lot of items of food, with the more expensive food items paid out of funds. Father Christmas's presents for our church family, are also generously given by Committee members. We have been able to give £200 to Church funds out of the proceeds.

6. Parent and Toddler Group—Janet Lees

In the five years or so that I have been involved with Toddler Group, there have been changes in the composition of the group. Many of our Mums have to return to full or part-time work after their maternity leave, which means that we have no sooner got to know them, when they are leaving us! It also means that we have as many babies as toddlers in the group, and that our numbers are always changing. We currently have 19 parents/grandparents and 23 children.

The Toddler Group facebook page is managed by Katie Johnson and is proving to be very popular with our parents.

The autumn term is always our busiest time of year. We had our Harvest Festival in October, led by Rob, who does very well with so many young children to keep engaged and interested! Our Harvest donation amounted to £60.00 which we sent to Hope House Hospice.

In November we donated two 'shoe boxes' to operation Christmas Child, as well as running the Toddler Group tombola stall at St John's Christmas fair. Both of which were very well supported by our mums and grandmas.

December saw our Toddler Group Nativity – we had to co-opt some older brothers and sisters to help us, as quite a few of our families were away visiting their extended families in the run-up to Christmas. The Christmas party was enjoyed by all the children.

Dot Charlesworth visited Toddler Group in autumn and again in the spring, when she was accompanied by Sheila Walwyn, to do craft activities with the children – they loved making autumn leaf collages and pictures of Elmer the Elephant!

We are currently planning our annual trip to Chester Zoo.

7. Events Report—Chris Crowther

8. Network Report—Chris Crowther

Network (MWiB) continued to meet monthly up to Christmas 2017. Via the wonders of technology, we have been able to 'visit' Boston, Peru and the Brazilian rainforest. We have enjoyed our usual visit to Wyndhurst last July, re-watching the 'Songs of Praise' DVD, a trip to Bellis's Garden Centre as well as a social afternoon sharing favourite books/music/poem or artwork and our Christmas party in December. We had a two month break and resumed meetings on March 27th with Rev Rob Weir as speaker. Attendance remains in the low 'teens but we will be able to contribute to Church funds and MWiB this year.

We would like a few more people to join our group which meets on the fourth Tuesday of each month, March to November and the first Tuesday in December. Anyone is welcome!

9. Churches Together in Whitchurch—Mike Nimmo

Four meetings were held at which reps from the four churches planned and discussed joint events, actions and information. Examples of this are the Lent Lunches and Courses, Walk of Witness on Good Friday, Party in the Park, Christian Aid Week and Christmas Cards to the community. Responsibility for particular services and events continue to be rotated round the four churches. The reps have taken back actions to their respective Church for implementation by the appropriate committee or person such as the Worship Committee, the Newsletter editor and so on. The meeting has continued to keep informed on the work of FOODBANK, Christian Aid and Fair Trade.

Hazel and I are standing down as St John's reps to Churches Together and 2 new reps are therefore required.

10. Pastoral Committee Report—Hazel Nimmo

We have also had a welcome addition to the team of Pastoral Visitors, namely Brian Faulkner.

11. Safeguarding Report—Hazel Nimmo

As in other Churches and organisations, Safeguarding has become quite a big issue and we are required to carry out Risk Assessments for events taking place in the church, or off-site, which involve children and also vulnerable adults.

Anyone who holds a significant role in the church needs to attend a

12. Christian Aid Report—Helen Trigg

Christian Aid Week 2017 in May

We had 49 people collecting house to house in Whitchurch.

St John's collected: £935.60

Bookshrop: £86.85

House to House Total: £2733.62

United Service: £435.96

CAW Total: £3169.58 (2016: £3380.82)

It was agreed that although the total was down on last year it was not enough to cause concern as several collectors had been away on holiday.

£1112.50 of the money given in C.A. Week had been gift-aided.

Christmas cards coffee morning in November

This had been very successful. Lots of gifts and cards had been sold as well as others ordered. The final total was £234.

Christmas Pew Collection in December

Total collected this year was £252.50 of which £165 was gift aided. St John's contributed £69.

2018 so far:

Quiz at Doddington Lodge in March

This was very successful and enjoyed by all who took part. Total raised: £207.

Lent Lunches in February and March

The total raised: £550.51 (£641 last year). The cheese was again donated by Belton Farm and was very popular.

13. Fairtrade/Traidcraft Report - Helen Trigg

The monthly Traidcraft stall at coffee time at St John's on the first Sunday in the month, and in other churches on other Sundays, has continued alongside the chance to order more unusual food/gifts. Sales are generally a little down on last year.

Judy Bellingham continues to run the Friday Traidcraft stall in the indoor market with occasional help from the rest of the group. We are building up a group of faithful customers. We feel it is extremely important to continue to sell Traidcraft goods as Traidcraft is one of the few companies taking on small farmers and producers (the poorest) who the supermarkets are not interested in.

Also the 10% that we as a group make on each item is given away to Christian Aid in the form of a gift each year. This year £500 was donated. If you could commit to buying even just one item from either the weekly Friday market or our stall each month, we and the poor of the world would be very grateful, and you will get to enjoy some of our delicious and beautiful goods.

14. Junior Church Annual Report—Helen Trigg

Children

There are three children who come out to Junior Church most weeks and three who come around once a month. We invite the 2 year-olds to occasionally take part in a suitable activity in the children's corner.

Leaders and helpers

We now have 3 leaders – Brenda Aumeer, Briony Myles-Hook and Helen Trigg; and 3 helpers – Wendy Proffitt, Chris Crowther and Janet Lees.

DBR checks and safeguarding training update

All leaders and helpers have up to date DBS certificates. Four have been on the refresher safeguarding training.

Involving the children more in the morning service

They again helped receive goods for the Foodbank at the Harvest service.

The children were involved with distributing the mother's day posies and the palm crosses.

One by one, they fled to her house and she welcomed them in. As the storm raged on, she shared food and a safe shelter for several days.



Marcelin Abellard and his daughters Ketia, Linda and Keshna still haven't recovered from Hurricane Matthew. It's over a year since Marcelin and his daughters lost their home, but they're still living in a 2x2m windowless concrete block. Marcelin doesn't expect them to survive if another hurricane hits.


