Steward's Letter

Dear Friends,

I will bring you up to date with progress or otherwise with our **heating**

system. Although nothing seems to be happening we have been working hard and have at last a new quite for the rebuilding of the pipework at approximately £1500 + VAT. The plumber who installed the boilers and heat exchanger pipework has sent us a long letter giving us many reasons as to why it was fitted the way it was. These I do not recognise and brings my temperature to boiling point but I think we must not let our emotions take over and instead get the best deal that we can under the circumstances. We can then look forward to a more comfortable winter and hopefully get more heat at less cost.

The Tower Clock is going again thanks to Mr. George Edge (who worked for Joyce's Clocks in Whitchurch for 23 years) - although he has some work to do on the mechanism later in the year when he has more time. We must thank Whitchurch Town Council for the grant that we were awarded this spring - and give NO THANKS to Scottish Power for the damage their fault under St. John's Street did to the clock and the blower motor in the organ, which cost us approximately £450.

2018 has been unusual to say the least from extreme cold and wet that lasted until the end of April, to the hottest and driest summer we have had since 1976 that followed.

Many trees and shrubs have gone into Autumn mode and many will not recover. I think the only advantage is that we have not had to turn our chapel heating system on, which has saved us many £s on our gas bill - the July account was only 59p! August 8^{th} was the first day I could do any work in the greenhouse without risk of suffocation since May of this year.

- Did you know that each one of us consume or use an average of 37 gallons of water every day? It is no wonder reservoirs are almost empty!
- Did you also know, with Brexit in mind, that if we did not import any food from the rest of the world, ours would have run out on August 16th this year?

Disabled Access

This week the Refurbishment Committee and Church Council will each have to make a decision on the over-budget quote we have received for the proposed disabled access work. The two lowest quotes are 30% over budget, and the others 100% or more over! The choice is either to raise more money or trim the job to suit our budget - which is my favoured solution. What would your choice be? Please come and talk to me about it. Whatever decision we make, we must not end up in debt.

Book Review – Celebration of Discipline:

The Path to Spiritual Growth

Further to my article in the last newsletter, I'm very pleased that a number of people are joining me in reading a book by Richard Foster called Celebration of Discipline: The Path to Spiritual Growth. I have read Part 1 (of 3) and, as promised, I am sharing my reflections on what I have read so far.

The book begins by saying that "superficiality is the curse of our age." The Disciplines of the spiritual life call us to move beyond surface living into the depths. The world around us wants to get on with *real* business in the *real* world, but we need to be encouraged to move beyond the prejudice of our age and affirm with our best scientists that more than the material world exists.

At the beginning, the book lists several pitfall which it warns readers against, such as treating the Disciplines as soul-killing laws, and the temptation to study the Disciplines without experiencing them.

Part 1 of the book focuses on the inward Disciplines of meditation, prayer, fasting and study.

- Meditation Christian meditation, very simply, is the ability to hear God's voice and obey his word. The truth of the matter is that the great God of the universe, the Creator of all things desires our fellowship. We need to pray for the desire to meditate and the grace to do so. My favourite place to be alone and silent, to think, pray and reflect is looking out of my bedroom window at the fields, the cows and sheep! The beauty of God's creation.
- Prayer Of all the Disciplines, prayer is the most central because it ushers us into perpetual communication with the Father. Real prayer is something we learn. To understand that the work of prayer involves a learning process saves us from arrogantly dismissing it as false or unreal.

At the same time we should never make prayer too complicated – Jesus taught us to come like children to a father. Openness, honesty and trust mark the communication of children with their father.

- Fasting This is something which has fallen out of favour over the years, but the book reminds us that Scripture has much to say about fasting. Throughout Scripture, fasting refers to abstaining from food for spiritual purposes. Fasting must forever centre on God. It must be God-initiated and Godordained. Fasting reminds us that we are sustained: 'by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God' (Matt 4:4).
- Study Of the inward Disciplines, this is the one which resonated most with me. We are called to be transformed by the renewing of our minds and study helps us into 'rightthinking'. The book states that many Christians are faithful in church attendance and earnest in fulfilling their religious duties yet still they are not changed. Why? Because they have never taken up one of the central ways God uses to change us: study. Both verbal and non-verbal fields of study are explained with the assertion that one of the greatest needs amongst Christians today is reading large portions of Scripture (rather than fragmentary and sporadic reading).

Well I have to say that I am enjoying reading the book. At times I have found it hard going, and often I don't *feel* like reading it, but I have made myself, and it has been a revelation and a joy. The whole experience has taught me that you really do need to be intentional about discipleship – it doesn't just happen – you have to make the effort!

The most important thing for me is that I don't just read it and then go back to life as it was before. It is my prayer that God will use the book to challenge me, teach me and change me. I recognise that the inner transformation I need is God's work, not mine. My responsibility is to make the effort! In many ways I believe that the depth of our relationship with God comes down to one word – time. Like any friendship or relationship we have to devote time to it and I believe it's exactly the same in our relationship with God. We are so distracted by the things of this world, maybe our first prayer needs to be asking for a *desire* to spend time with God.

Here is a prayer from another Richard Foster book on prayer which is very apt for me!

Dear Jesus, how desperately I need to learn to pray. And yet, when I am honest I know that I often do not even want to pray. I am distracted! I am stubborn! I am self-centred! In your mercy, Jesus, bring my want-er more in line with my need-er so that can come to want what I need. In your name and for your sake, I pray. Amen

In the October newsletter I will share my reflections on Part 2 of the book, which explores the outward Disciplines of simplicity, solitude, submission and service.

Shropshire Historic Churches Trust Ride & Stride Event

Once again, we have registered St John's with the SHCT fund raising event, **Ride & Stride** which this year takes place on **Saturday 8th September**, as part of Heritage Weekend.

This is a 3-pronged event.

1.) The church opens to visitors from 10am to 6pm with people manning it through the day. Visitors will come from across the county (and neighbouring ones) either walking, cycling, or riding horses **or in a car**, to as many churches/chapels as they can manage.



2.) Members of the church can Ride or Stride between as many churches/chapels as they are able in the time.

3.) Participants (Riders, Striders and church sitters etc.) obtain as much sponsorship as possible. It is possible to Gift Aid which is a valued extra.

As usual we are also planning to hold a coffee morning between 10am and 12 noon and hopefully a sponsored Hymn sing between 2 and 3pm. There will be a display of our heritage information and we are listed as a place to visit. As we could have more visitors than usual it would be helpful to have volunteers on a rota to steward the Church.

The organisers have now agreed that people **can use cars** to help them visit churches as the ones that are participating are often scattered. So, if you would like a morning or afternoon driving round beautiful Shropshire countryside, and raising funds from sponsorship at the same time, then this is your chance.

MINISTERS

I know I should refer to Ministers, e.g. Rev. Rob Weir as Presbyters but a recent report said only 3% of Methodists recognized the word Presbyters.

A report to the Methodist Conference, reported in the Methodist Recorder, provided some alarming facts. These I thought, ought to be brought to your attention.

This year 90 Ministers retired (sat down) only 38 Ministers were Ordained.

This means that in this new Methodist year we have 52 less Ministers in full time work!

Added to this alarming figure, is that only 20 people have been accepted for Initial Training to become future Ministers. That is 18 less than have been Ordained in 2018.

Looking at facts and figures based on one year can be misleading. However, the Stationing Committee predicts that in 2 years time there will be 189 less Ministers in active work!

What does this mean for you reading these figures?

The Ministers we have at present, will be spread over more churches, meaning:-

Ministers will be less available to lead our Sunday Services. Ministers will have less time for Pastoral Care.

Winisters will have less time for Pastoral Care.

Ministers will have less time to be a Leader in our churches.

For us at St. John's this will not have an immediate effect, as no changes are imminent, however be warned! The Methodist Church has relied heavily on lay people, Local Preachers, Church Stewards and Pastoral Visitors.

As a church, we need lay people like you to ask yourselves: Is God calling me to work in the church and in so doing, assist in ministering to others?
