How Christ is made present in the world today.

Our world is in turmoil due to war, poverty, changing legislation and political unrest, where people want instant answers and think that happiness is something that can be bought. People are unhappy, struggling with mental health, financial pressures and where words are used on social media to influence, gain favour and destroy lives — Christ stands in their midst. The Methodist Church like other denominations are facing change, dwindling congregations populated with older people having to decide to continue as they are or close — Christ stands in their midst. Christ is in the conversations on street corners, in the towns and cities. Christ is in the hearts of those donating to foodbanks and trying to be a good neighbour. Christ is in the social action stories, standing up and speaking out to reduce poverty and hardship. Christ stands in the midst of all of this.

As a nation, there is a growing awareness of the need for stand up against injustice, to challenge the misconceptions and misinformation that floods our world. As Christians we are called to love our neighbours as ourselves (Matthew 28 v 39), as Methodists we are called to live out our faith demonstrating 'Our Calling' and helping communicate the Message of Christ and the 'Four All's – through worship, learning and caring, service and evangelism we keep Christ as the central focus of our faith and demonstrate this, building relationships and standing with people to make a different through Christ, presenting Christ to the world within which we live, demonstrating Christ's presence in our world.

Methodism started at grass roots level with John Wesley, George Whitefield and others going to where people were, into fields, into towns, to the coal pit face, and telling them of the love of God. People who may have been classed as on the margins of society in John Wesley's time, throughout history and now in our time – need Christ. We need to be able to talk about our faith to others, to direct people to God through our actions and words. For some seeing faith lived out daily is a strong witness that enables conversations – enabling others to find their own voice to speak up.

God is bringing the church back to basics, to the important aspects of life, to the Gospel of Christ and Kingdom values, stripping away the baggage that we bring

with us to church and take home again. God is challenging the church to be the body of Christ and to meet the needs of those within our communities. Christ is not hidden in our communities, yet we don't always see him at work - perhaps we are not looking in the right places. Christ is in the relationships and the conversations at the bus stop or train station. Christ is in the opportunities that God gives us, Christ is in our actions.

For people to see Christ at work in the world, they need to be able to see Christ in us through our actions and our words, not just on a Sunday but through our daily journey and encounters. Christ is made present through relationships that we have and build with others.

In our communities where people are struggling to put food on the table or feed the children during the school holidays we can make Christ known, through our community links with Foodbanks, through helping support regular opportunities where food collections are completed in the supermarkets or by providing children's events during school holidays that include a meal.

For those that we know who are struggling financially we may be able to share with them the work of Christians Against Poverty and direct people to the nearest group or set one up in our community. We may be aware of a specific need that we are able to support, providing help to those in need. This might be specific and directed towards a person that we know through conversation or simply be through sharing a link on social media to raise awareness of a situation or a petition that is being bought before Parliament by the Joint Public Issues Team.

The church is a witness within the community, we have opportunities as Christians to demonstrate Christ's life to others through actions and words, through joint denominations events and being part of Churches Together in our areas. The partnership with other churches in our areas allows us to stand up against injustice to present a joined-up approach – to support and to stand with people in times of difficulty and joy. Christ is made present in our world through us the body of Christ.

Colour my world!

We must celebrate the colours of our world and thank our God — whatever we imagine him to be for the beautiful world we live in with it's many colours of so many hues.

The outside ramps mean easier access to our building. Easier for push chairs, prams, buggies, disability scooters and funeral gurneys. The building is so much brighter with lots of light – I'm told that our church is a beacon of light on a hill at night! Roll on the dark nights when I can see for myself!

When we get back to normal, when the Opening Ceremony is all over, then what? What will all the changes mean for our church? Will anything be different? What will we decide to do with the new space by our new door? Do you have any ideas? If so, please let one of the Stewards know. Unfortunately, one of the legacies of this project has been that we have had to borrow money to complete the job, so, our immediate task is to repay this debt. We have a series of events planned, the first of which is the Jumble Sale on 6th July. Also, please don't forget our Autumn Concert featuring the Newport Male Voice Choir on Friday 18th October 2019.

I pose the question again – will anything be different now that we

have such an easily accessible church? Hopefully, people will look at the outside and be curious about what is going on inside. Our mission must be to share our faith with friends who have yet to find Jesus. If we don't do that, then everything will have been a waste of time — wont it?

So what <u>is</u> the legacy of the Project? What are left with? We now have a bright, well – lit, easily accessible building. It is up to us as a church to decide how to go forward. Unfortunately, it has left the church in debt and that is an issue which Church Council will have to address. We have planned a series of money raising events so that we can re-pay our debts. Please do your best to support us in as many events as possible. You will recall that we had planned to push ahead with Phase II which is the refurbishment of the interior of the church, but Church Council have decided to shelve that for the time being. Let's get our feet back on the ground, take stock, and then decide how we move forward.

On a personal note, and as I said at the Annual Church General Meeting, it is time to hand over the reins to someone else, so I am stepping down. The journey has been a long one – and it's not just about me. I acknowledge all the pioneering work done by Michael Mulliner, and, more recently, Mike Nimmo.




