And if every Christian puts their hands at God's disposal - maybe we can make this world more like how it should be, rather than the mess it currently is.

We were told that the Circuit system is the way it is and would not change regardless of individual chapel's circumstances and financial ability to pay their own Assessments. Our own cash flow issue has been caused by our own inability to raise sufficient funds to pay our Assessment, despite all our efforts.

Changing the subject. What a day I have had today-everything in my favour has been against me. Last night was perfect - not too hot, not too cold in the garden. What a good job it goes dark every day. At least it means that I have to stop working a bit sooner!

At the Circuit meeting in Sandbach the other night, we were waiting for the meeting to start and there was a kerfuffle going on behind us. Had a mouse come out of someone's handbag? No! It was a large spider making a rapid escape from a bag!

And finally, Vic & his family have been away last weekend. It's at times

like these that we realise what a debt of gratitude we owe to Vic for all the work he does behind the scenes preparing for our weekly services. A big thank you Vic for all your good work. 
