Let us be kind in our disagreements, and show our world that it is possible to disagree without that being a reason to cease being kind, compassionate, gentle, patient, and filled with humility.

The new year began with an unexpected phone call from Matt of Stone Edge Ltd., who was their site foreman and stonemason by trade, and who constructed our new doorway. He said the company had gone into receivership.

We did the snagging list at the end of December and sent it to our architect Ian Lucas. This was a list of jobs that did not come up to the standard we expected. As these jobs have not been addressed it means that our contract with stone edge was not complete and signed off.

On January 23rd we celebrated the 100th birthday of our regular attender Reg Hall, and not many churches can say they have had someone reach 100. To mark the occasion we planted a weeping cherry tree in the garden. I hope Reg will be pleased with it. On Sunday 19th Reg cut his cake and shared it around. The following Sunday, Sheila and I were honoured to be invited to his birthday celebrations at Fauls Village Hall, which was very enjoyable, meeting many people whom I have not seen for years.

January this year, Sheila and I were invited to go to the Manchester Arena to see our grandson William take part in the Young Voices Choir. What an experience it was – our first visit to this 21,000 seat arena – the largest in the UK. An audience of approximately 10,000 mums, dads and grandparents, together with a choir of 7,826 10 year-old primary school children. The volume of noise had to be heard to be believed! The choir was made up of choirs from NW Midlands, NW England and N Wales. The show was complete with singer Tony Hadley of Spandau ballet and a dance troupe.

After reading Dot's column in the February newsletter about climate change/global warming, it's fair to say that the reason Donald Trump says it's a myth is because he was put into office with funds supplied by the petroleum industry and gun lobby in America. I have no doubt that other politicians are in the same position in various countries around the world. This must change. As for climate change, I cannot remember a longer, wetter period of time. A Reflection on Disney Pixar's Film "Up"

Life started out as one great big adventure for Carl Fredricksen, a character from the Disney Pixar's animation film "Up" (2009). As a young child, he wanted to be an explorer but, while life showed him lots of adventures, there was always one adventure he promised his childhood sweetheart that never materialised, in her lifetime at least. Some things happened in his life that didn't quite go to plan. After marrying, they lose their first child and don't have any more children. Saving up for this big promised adventure was often met with other bills to pay. As old age approached, his wife sadly passed away and he begins to feel the aches and pains of old age. Carl is persuaded to leave the home he spent most of his life in, because developers want his land and see him as an easy target to exploit. Becoming angry at the way life has and is still treating him makes him lash out physically at someone, leaving that person with an injury and him with a court summons. He is labelled a menace and in need of a retirement home where his independence would be taken from him. At breaking point, having now reached the place where he is forced out of house and home to enter a retirement village, he decides to attach his house with thousands of colourful helium balloons to prevent his home from being bulldozed and "up" goes the house on the adventure he promised his late wife: to take the house and live on top of Paradise Falls.



On his journey he meets an eight-year-old boy, Russell, who is trying to earn an "assisting to elderly" badge to complete his collection, which will allow him to move on to becoming a Senior Wilderness Explorer. At first, all this young boy wants to do is finish a simple task that will enable him to complete his badge collection but, as the film unfolds, he goes on an adventure and explores a wilderness bigger than his back garden!

Some of the best made plans don't always go as expected, and Carl and Russell encounter different problems along the way. Despite this, they finally make it to Paradise Falls. When there, Carl opens his late wife's adventure scrapbook, which she started when she was a child. Inside the book is a page with the title: "The Stuff I'm Going To Do". When she was young, those pages would have been filled with the adventure of going to Paradise Falls, but, for the first time, Carl discovers that his late wife completed the scrap book, despite never personally going there. Instead, she filled her pages with pictures of them getting married, laughing and having fun, growing old and reading together, taking picnics in the park and enjoying a nice cup of tea. At the end of her book she wrote, "Thanks for the adventure - now go have a new one! Love Ellie." She was telling him to live his life to the full and embrace all of life's adventures, even if they are not quite what he originally had in mind. Carl set out on this adventure to try and finish what he thought she would have wanted. In the end, he discovers that Ellie had already found her own paradise in just being with Carl. By the end of the film, Carl's house and possessions fall away from him, but what is left are new friends and new adventures.

How does this film relate to contemporary Christian living? Well, as Christians, we experience the wilderness on the way to our "paradise falls", or our dreams being fulfilled. We don't always get to the destination in the way we want, or when we want, and, other times, we get to a different destination altogether from the one we planned! On the reverse of the DVD box are these words: "life's biggest adventures aren't the ones you set out looking for". Perhaps it should continue to say: "because God has something better in mind". We should hold loosely to the things of this world and hold onto the things which are eternal. Yes, live your life to the full, but don't search for fulfilment in the things of this world, which inevitably come to an end. Instead search for the things which last and are eternal. Sometimes, it's the fact of whether we've got enough faith to trust ALL things into God's hand, such as our dreams and desires, or are we going to keep some of them? Are we willing to let go of the things we hold onto and instead hold onto God and the plans of a hope and a future He wants to give us? (Jeremiah 29 v 11).

What is interesting about this film isn't the way in which Carl fights through the problems he faces but how, through those problems, he realises a different, yet better, adventure from the one he originally planned. So, rather than focusing on the adventures you've always wanted to do but never done, try looking at the ones you've already been on and be excited about those God has planned for you instead. Don't think you are too old to have any more adventures and don't think you are too young not to have any yet.

<u>Churches Together Lent Course</u>

This year our Lent Course is going to be akin to a Book Group. Each person will be asked to read a couple of chapters before each meeting and then there will be some led discussion. The book is Andrew Smith's "Vibrant Christianity in Multifaith Britain". Andrew is Director of Interfaith Relations for the Bishop of Birmingham and we hope that he will come to speak and answer questions at a joint session towards the end of Lent. He led the initiative to create the Ethical Guidelines for Witness, produced by the National Christian Muslim Forum 2006-2011. The book is accessible & thoughtprovoking and encourages us to think seriously about how we live as Christians in an increasingly multifaith society. Whether we meet people of different faiths day to day or mainly hear about them in the media, this book will give us confidence to express our faith in a religiously diverse world. Drawing on Scripture and years of experience, the author both challenges preconceptions and offers practical advice.
