How can we respond to the Climate Emergency?





Everyone is hoping that 2021 will be a better year than 2020. There is still some way to go before the end of the coronavirus pandemic, but with the vaccine rollout beginning in the UK, plans are being drawn up for life post-Covid. Yet the rush to return to normal risks leaving many of the world's problems unsolved. So this year Christians everywhere are campaigning to reclaim our common home – making sure the recovery from the pandemic includes everyone and tackles global poverty, injustice and the climate crisis.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, has said that responding to Climate Change is an essential part of our responsibility to safeguard God's creation. Pope Francis has told Catholics that climate change is the greatest threat to life our Earth has ever seen – and that it is caused by humans. As CAFOD says, Climate change affects our health, our homes, our heritage and our beautiful landscapes. Our community centres where we meet, our sports fields where we play and our places of pilgrimage where we reflect. It also ruins the work we do to fight poverty. Enough. Together, we can turn the tide. We can call our politicians to go further and faster with emission cuts. We can treat our common home with respect and choose to live sustainably. The Methodist Church has said together we can raise our voices to call for ambitious change nationally and internationally, as well as seeking it in our own communities. Together, churches can commit to the kind of future we want to see.

Why the eyes of the world will be on the UK in 2021

The UK government will be hosting two major international meetings this year. The **G7 summit** will bring together the heads of government from seven of the world's richest countries and will take place in summer 2021. The UK will also be hosting the UN 'COP26' climate talks in Glasgow between 1-12 November 2021. This will be the largest gathering of world leaders ever to take place on British soil. Both of the conferences will be crucial moments for leaders to tackle the climate crisis and cancel unjust debts for developing countries. And with the UK taking on the G7 and COP26 presidency, Prime Minister Boris Johnson will be under pressure to make sure world leaders at the talks show the ambition needed for a transformative global recovery from the pandemic.

2021 is the year to reclaim our common home

All of our lives have been turned upside down in the past year and we all want to go back to normal as soon as possible. But the last thing we want to do is to go back to the injustices and inequalities of the 'old' normal which have made this crisis even worse. We in the UK have a massive part to play in building a better normal, calling on Boris Johnson to show the leadership we desperately need at the key meetings the UK is hosting this year. We are all in the same boat as one global family. If we're going to avoid repeating the mistakes of the past, that is the crucial lesson we need to take forward into 2021.

You can also take part in **Show the Love**, a campaign supported by the Churches, Christian Aid, the Womens Institute, the Climate Coalition and many others, by making a green heart to decorate your home and remind you that all actions you take, however small, can help to safeguard our planet. More information, including examples of felt hearts and a pattern for knitting hearts can be found on our church website under our new group Justice and Peace (see elsewhere in this newsletter). We plan to put a green heart on the noticeboards inside and outside our Church.

God of love, show us our place in this world as the channels of your love for all creatures of this earth. Enlighten those who possess power and money that they may love the common good, advance the weak, and care for this world in which we live. Fill us with your power and light, help us to protect your creation, and build a world of justice, peace, love and beauty. Amen.

ADVENT

A message of Hope to Whitchurch and beyond.

These are my own personal reflections of Advent.

The Worship Committee met in mid October and as part of the agenda we talked about Advent and having a Theme. With the country in a crisis, we thought that the church needs to bring a message of Hope.

The Walking Nativity that was being organized by Churches Together, indicated that our church may have the scene of Angels appearing to Mary.

Over the coming weeks and further meetings we agreed that Angels would be our Theme.

Our preachers on the four Sundays of Advent preached on the Angels appearing to Zechariah, Mary, Joseph and the Shepherds. Daily devotions prepared by Rob, were sent out to all our members. Daily messages were posted on the Town and Church facebook pages.

People in the church, schools and in the community were encouraged to knit, make and paint angels. These decorated the church, were displayed in shop windows and over 30 were given out to people who were on their own or faced a difficult Christmas. Our Minister received request for Angels from people in the town and one was even sent to Shifnal!

The Whitchurch Herald provided good coverage over many weeks. A Banner hung outside the church showing an Angel with the message 'Be not afraid, God is with us'.

Chocolate angels with the Christmas story were given out to children visiting our church on the 12th December. More people visited the church on the 19th December, some having never been in the church before.

To enable actual Carol Singing and to provide a greater virus free zone, an additional Carol Service took place outside on the afternoon of the Candlelight Carol Service day.

A virtual Carol Service, Carols and a Cuppa and advent reflections took place on Zoom, which was also available on the telephone.

No Knead Bread

The recipe says this is made in a Dutch oven but a strong casserole with lid will work just as well, don't use Pyrex glass though as it may shatter. I use a large clay casserole.

405 grams (or 3 cups) Strong bread Flour 1.5 teaspoons salt 2 teaspoons dried yeast 1.5 cups of warm water

Sieve flour into a bowl and add salt and then yeast. Mix with a knife to a soft dough with the water (it will be very soft). Cover the bowl with a plate and leave on worktop for at least 2 hours but you can leave overnight.


Set oven to 230 degrees (fan) or equivalent. Put you Dutch oven or strong casserole in the oven with its lid.

The dough will have bubbled up and will be soft but elastic. Scrape out onto a floured worktop (it will still be soft but that's ok), and coax it into a round shape. I use a pallet knife. Then gently slide it onto a large square of greaseproof paper, but sprinkle the paper with flour first. Take your hot pot out of the oven and remove the lid, gently pick up your loaf with the four corners of greaseproof paper and put in your pot (with the greaseproof paper), pull the corners of paper to the edges and put on the hot lid. Return to the over and bake for 30 minutes, remove the lid and bake for another 15 minutes.

You need to leave it to stand for 10 minutes before cutting.

ENJOY!

PS; I buy my yeast at Refill Your Boots in the high street loose and keep it in a jam jar. It's economical and good for the planet.
