## Message from the Manse

Dear Friends,



In one of Fred Kaan's hymns, "We turn to you, O God of every nation", there is a striking final line: "defeat our Babel with your Pentecost!"

Pentecost is approaching towards the end of May, and with it, it brings images for us of that dramatic scene: tongues like fire, the apostles suddenly able to speak the languages of those around them, and every visitor to Jerusalem wondering how it is that they hear the glory of God proclaimed in their own tongue.

It's also though a reminder that God's way is not the way of force. The story of Babel is of humanity challenging God, and their languages then being confused because they have dared to claim that place of power and authority belonging to God; but the reversal, at Pentecost, is very different. God doesn't make all languages as one, although God has the power to do so; instead, each hears the praise of God in their own language, reaching them where they are, and inviting them to share in God's Grace through Jesus Christ.

It's an object lesson for us too. When we talk of wanting people to come to know Jesus, to hear of the Grace of God, we have to speak their language - we have to meet them where they are. And then, we can start showing and demonstrating for them the Grace and Love that God has shown to us, and placed into our hearts.

God created each one of us as unique individuals with equally unique abilities.

We feel connected to family now and feel 'safe' in our older years.

We miss our friends in Whitchurch of course, and will never forget you all.

### Christian Aid Week 10th – 16th May 2021

In Kenya, extreme dry weather is making it harder and harder to survive. For communities fighting the climate crisis, every last drop of water matters and every last one of us can help them thrive. The coronavirus pandemic has only increased the urgent need for families to access a reliable source of water. The devastating climate crisis robs people of the water and so also the food they need to live. Rose walks for six hours to fetch water for her grandchildren. She tries hard to give them the kind of life she remembers



from when she was a girl: when the rivers flowed with water and the crops bore fruit. Rose and her grandchildren shouldn't have to suffer hunger. A simple earth dam, built with the help of Christian Aid's partners and your donations, could completely change their lives. This Christian Aid Week, you can be one of the hundreds of thousands of our supporters who give, act and pray to stop this climate crisis causing people like Rose and her family to be hungry.

From envelope collections to walking 300,000 steps in May, Christian Aid Week brings people together as one community against global poverty and injustice.

### 1. Update on Mission Planning Process

### Step 2: Do a Community Audit

**Mike** will arrange a meeting with Vic and Chris to discuss what he has found out so far. He will approach the Beacon to see which gaps in the community they have identified but are not planning to fill.

**Chris** emphasised the importance of working with other churches not duplicating efforts.

### Step 3: Carry out a Review of our Church.

**Hazel** reported that she had met with **Briony and Dorothy** and a 3-pronged approach to the review is planned:

Send out a questionnaire to members and adherents to find out about their **personal experiences** at St John's.

Review the table of **activities** previously run by the church by speaking to those involved and looking at the mission focus of each activity. Were prayers regularly said, hymns sung or opportunities for personal witness?

Circulate **"What makes a Mission Shaped Church"** the document produced by the Circuit, discussed at the Circuit Meeting in March and included in the Mission in Love Unites Us webinar. Initially this will be sent to members of this group and they will be asked to score our Church on the scale 1 to 10.

Hazel, Briony and Dorothy will meet to draft the questions to circulate before the next meeting.

### 2. Sharing the Mission Planning Process

Rob will write in the **June Newsletter** about the Mission Planning Process and its importance to the future of St John's so that everyone knows what we are doing and why we need to do it. Hopefully, this will encourage everyone to return their questionnaires and take part I the reviews. The Mission Group will share the process and its intentions with **Church Council on 23<sup>rd</sup> June** so that everyone is behind it.

#### 3. Circuit webinar: Mission in Love Unites Us

So far this has been attended by Brian & Dorothy, Helen & Vic, Mike & Hazel, Chris, Briony and Rob. Feedback was positive as it gives an insight into where the Circuit is coming from and the examples given open up new possibilities for the future of our church. Rob emphasised the need for churches to be clear about their mission when requesting funding in future.

Everyone agreed that we should encourage more people from St John's to attend and the next two dates on zoom will be included in the May newsletter.

## **50 YEARS of PREACHING**

At the Chapel Anniversary (18/4/21), the church acknowledged 142 years of the present building. The Rev. Rob Weir also acknowledged that I had been an Accredited Local Preacher for 50 years, presenting me with a certificate signed by the President and also the Vice President of the Methodist Conference. This was slightly belated, as this was passed to Rob during the first lockdown, so it has been trying to find the right opportunity to do this.

A few members in church said you must have been very young when you started, even referring to short trousers! It was in June 1967 at a Billy Graham relay rally in Stoke, that I went forward to give my life to Christ.

The following year, I was challenged to become a Local Preacher. I commenced 2 years of study and every six months sat a written exam in the study of the then Minister, the Rev. Kenneth Wilkinson, in what is now Westune. The exam topics were the Old Testament, New Testament, Christian Doctrine and Worship & Preaching. During these studies, I would be required to present assignments every couple of weeks to an outside Tutor.

During this training, you are placed On Note and subsequently On Trial. Miss Dora Herbert was the Preacher that I was linked to. I would begin by reading a lesson in her service, then prayers, before eventually taking the whole service.

I can't remember at which Church my first service was. I do remember in May 1968, giving the address at the

Youth Service in Castle Hill, when I spoke on being made in the image of God from the Book of Genesis.

In December 1970, having passed all the exams, the Local Preacher's Meeting recommended to the Circuit Meeting that I become an Accredited Local Preacher. So began what to date is over 50 years of leading worship. In those early days, I would be preaching 10 – 12 services a quarter. The Circuit had more evening services and also afternoons. 24 churches and only 3 Ministers!

The demand on Preachers was great. However, we would only prepare 3 /4 services a quarter. Taking these to the various congregations with some slight adjustment to hymns, to suit the occasion and the congregation.

Gwen remarked after my presentation, that she must have been playing for me for most of the 50 years. Gwen was only in her early teens when she would play for odd hymns under her Auntie's guidance.

At the final Circuit Service of the Whitchurch Circuit in Lightwood Green in July 2010, is when I was presented with a Certificate recognizing 40 years of Preaching.

Thank you for your support and encouraging words over these many years.

## Justice & Peace: Praying for the Climate Emergency

Thank you to everyone as we continue to pray that global leaders will face up to the challenges of the Climate Emergency and take the necessary actions to reduce Global temperatures before it is too late.

For those of you who would like to find out more, we recommend the 3 part BBC Documentary **Greta Thunberg: A Year to Change the World.** Climate activist Greta Thunberg takes a year off school to explore the science of global warming and challenge world leaders, calling for action on climate change. She meets a range of experts, including David Attenborough, plus people affected by the implications of Global warming and the science is explained very clearly.

In another BBC series, **Climate Change: Ade on the frontline**, Ade Adepitan travels to the frontline of climate change to discover how life is being affected and looking for potential solutions. Both programmes highlight the interconnectedness of the crisis, demonstrating again and again how great the consequences of even the smallest change can be.

## UK Overseas Aid Budget Cuts

The UK government is planning to break their manifesto pledge and cut the overseas aid budget from 0.7% to 0.5% of gross national income (GNI).

## This is a matter of life and death.

Cutting the UK aid budget has dire consequences. It means we will compromise our country's values and break our foreign aid promises but ultimately, the poorest and most vulnerable people will pay the price.

Fewer children will be able to access a basic education. People will not be able to access vital health care during a global pandemic and more families will go hungry. I have written to the Prime Minister asking him to reconsider.
