#### Message from the Manse

Hello all,



Autumn is my favourite season! There is something comforting about wearing my favourite knitted cardigan and fluffy slippers at the end of the day and snuggling up on the sofa with a good book. For me, the beauty of creation is all around us in Autumn. There is something magical about watching the leaves changing colour turning from green, to red and to a golden yellow before they fall to the ground and we hear them crunch beneath our feet. In a time when the harvest is all safely gathered in; the land has been drilled with seeds for next year; Autumn is the time we pause and thank God for the blessings he has given us over the last year and pray for the year ahead.

In our church life the idea of planting and harvesting is one we can relate to. It is also the theme used in the Circuit's Vision Document; A Faithful and Fruitful Future, which can be found on the circuit website. This document asks us to reflect on the harvest we are gathering in and look for places that perhaps need some pruning and nurturing but also to celebrate what has flourished. This might seem quite difficult, especially after the last 18months of living through a pandemic but let me share with you what I've seen over just a few short weeks.

There is much to give thanks for. We have been welcomed into a lovely church community and already feeling settled in our new home. Friendship, love, compassion, and fellowship are certainly things that are **flourishing** at St Johns. These qualities make up the **good soil** in which to **plant** God's **seeds**.

The pastoral committee had become somewhat overwhelmed with very long lists and, with people needing to step down from post, they were concerned about how the pastoral care of the congregation and community who meet at church were going to be met. They had already done a lot of thinking about this before I arrived, so in effect the land had already been **cut back**, but now they needed some stakes to be put into the ground to help them **grow** stronger. So a new pastoral system has been formed. We recognised together that the pastoral care of each other was an integral part of our discipleship and so now as a whole church community we are responsible for watching over each other in love and to inform someone from the pastoral team if anyone is in need of some extra **nurturing**. This should enable us all to **grow** well together.

The launch of Bumps, Babies and Toddlers has seen a lot of **pruning** and **fertilising**. Cupboards are being cleaned out, toys are being sorted and lots of new ideas are being shared. While it's still early days there are signs of **new shoots** that will hopefully lead to a good **crop** this year.

**New shoots** are also wanting to push through. I have already been asked by three people if we can have a prayer group and a bible study. There is a zoom prayer each Monday for the next few weeks for Climate Justice (see Briony for details). These are all **seeds that** are being sewn for new ways of how we can respond and **supportive branches** of prayer are signs that as a church community we care for others and want a **fruitful harvest** for all.

I hope you too can see the promising signs of hope of a good harvest to come.

Hope is another theme of this season.

The evening of the 31<sup>st</sup> October might be a night, for some, of ghosts and monsters and all things that make us afraid. There are many things in this world we can be afraid of, but the very next day we have All Saints Day to remind us that good has overcome all evil. Remember we are not alone, God is with us, Christ has broken though all darkness and shines out into our world. The lighted pumpkin reminds us of

this, it contains a candle, the sign of Christ shining out to us.

As a mum of three children I know how hard it is to avoid the pull of the secular world to get involved with Halloween, but there are ways as Christians I think we can still get involved but share a different message. This Halloween we will be lighting up the manse with the light of Christ, and we will be having pumpkins that will shine out because Christ has come into the world, there is no more darkness and there is much to celebrate!

I hope this October you take time to give thanks for the Harvest that has been brought in and that you have hope for the seasons that lie ahead.

Our next port of call was Bettisfield Methodist—a delightful little chapel, but not open. We continued on along the A495 to Welshampton,(*St. Michael & All Angels*) where we met a couple seeking 'the kitchen in a cupboard' at Cobmere. We felt that this was a misprint and directed them to Colemere.

We continued into Ellesmere (*St. Mary's*) where we encountered a gentleman on the same mission as we were. I thought he looked familiar and it turned out to be the person who came to St. John's to present us with a certificate from SHCT a few weeks back.

We then doubled back and headed for Lyneal with Colemere (St. John the Evangelist) and there found the couple we'd met at Welshampton and saw the 'kitchen in a cupboard' which was very impressive and would look good and be useful at the back of our church! We had some very tasty cake and a welcome cup of coffee here. From here we followed some winding, narrow lanes to Cockshutt (St. Simon & St. Jude).

Myddle (*St. Peter's*) ,where we found some volunteers tidying up the large churchyard, was next on the list and we thought it was a very attractive village. We then headed for Clive (*All Saints*) and managed to park at the bottom of the path leading up to the church. Very conveniently there was a seat by the lychgate so we sat and ate our picnic lunches. On to Grinshill (*All Saints*)—the lane is still as bumpy as it was last year.

Lastly we called at Moreton Corbet (*St. Bartholomew's*) as Sarah was keen to see if a plaque dedicating the organ with her father's name on it was still there—it was so photos were duly taken. By this time we needed to be heading back to Whitchurch after a most enjoyable time exploring the highways and byways of our beautiful county.

Thank you to everyone who sponsored us. We raised  $\pounds$ 300. Added to this is another  $\pounds$ 50 which Tom Kelly donated as, at the last minute, he thought he would take part. He drove round some local churches and then went into Shrewsbury and walked round some there. Thank you, Tom. Also, thank you to Sarah for accompanying me. #### Pastoral Committee Report

On 7<sup>th</sup> September members of the Pastoral Committee met with Rev Donna in order to discuss pastoral care within our church community.

Currently here in Whitchurch, we have operated the traditional Methodist system of pastoral visitors each with a group of people with whom to keep in touch and visit. This group of pastoral visitors has shrunk over the years as people have moved away or became unable to visit due to advancing years and, more recently because of COVID19. The number of people each "Pastoral Visitor" was supposed to visit or keep in contact with grew and there was recognition that we were not fulfilling the role as we might.

On reading various pieces on the Methodist website, I became aware that other churches were experiencing similar issues and had started to think of alternative ways of caring for members of their church community.

What comes across is that in many churches a more informal "pastoral link system" supported by a small pastoral team has been introduced. In responding to the Gospel of God's love in Christ, we are **all** called in Christian Fellowship to look after each other and many of you will already be doing this with other individuals or groups within the church. This might be face-to-face over a coffee; a chatty phone call, by email or send an uplifting message or card.

Obviously the difficulty we would have will be to make sure no-one is forgotten about; whether they be members or adherents who attend church regularly, or those who can only attend occasionally and those who cannot attend at all due to ill-health.

A more formal way of proceeding came from looking at other churches where a number of people became Pastoral Links most of whom are "in touch" with at least 3 other people. The Pastoral Links are support by a small pastoral team consisting of the minister, pastoral secretary and a couple of other pastoral visitors and any concerns would be taken to one of those as appropriate.

So how do we proceed – what are the next steps? I would appreciate feedback on how you think we could introduce an appropriate Pastoral care system for our church always keeping at the forefront of our minds that in John 13 v 34 Jesus commands that "We love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples".


