Message from Rev. Donna Broadbent-Kelly February

Hello Friends,



There is a story told in the Bible about the Good Samaritan; it's told by Jesus in answer to the question 'Who is my neighbour?' after a rich young man has been reminded that his religious law asks him to

'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.' And to 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' Mark 12:30-31

The moral of story responds that your neighbour is the one who is seemingly least deserving of your love and help that you can find; whenever and wherever they are – and everyone else too – including yourself.

There is an interpretation of this reading that goes like this: Love your neighbour: your homeless neighbour, your Muslim neighbour, your black neighbour, your gay neighbour, your white neighbour, your Christian neighbour, your atheist neighbour, your racist neighbour, your addicted neighbour and so on.

Because if you love all of your neighbours and they love you, then we will also want the very best for each other and then maybe we can heal the divisions in our world that are every bit as deep as those between the Jews and the Samaritans of the original story.

The reality is though, that loving others is hard, especially when the person we are called to love is so difficult, or we find it hard to see past the difference of opinion or they have caused us harm. Loving the enemy is no easy task.

But what about those we find easy to love – surely there's no issues there?

Love it or loath it, February 14th is a day when we are to declare to our spouses that we love them! While I do like to receive a little something, I am always left asking myself why is it only on Valentine's Day that it is okay for us to declare our love for someone? Telling someone you love them is often met with comments that you are being too soft or gushy. It can also be a cause for embarrassment! Telling your teenage son, you love him and I hope he has a great day at the school gates is a complete no no! Cont.,

And why when we do declare our love does it have to be so expensive? The joke is that men everywhere are at risk of being put in the dog house if they don't shower their beloved with gifts on special occasions, but can't show gestures of love the rest of the year for risk of suspicion – the raised eyebrow for example when he walks in with a bunch of flowers and it's not your birthday, anniversary or any other special day. And the simple acts of love such as making a cuppa or drawing a heart on the shower screen are just not enough or looked over. Is loving someone meant to have so many rules attached to it on when and how it can be expressed?

So what is real love like? Well I think we have to turn to one who loved us first and taught us what love is. We turn to God. 1 Corinthians 13:4-7

"Love is patient, love is kind. Love does not envy, is not boastful, is not conceited, does not act improperly, is not selfish, is not provoked, and does not keep a record of wrongs. Love finds no joy in unrighteousness but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. And these three remain, faith, hope and love, but the greatest of these is love"

Love in 1 Corinthians 13 is astonishingly practical, and otherperson-centered. This is Gods way of love. Love is more than a feeling, it's a way of living. Love shows kindness. Love shows patience. Love seeks the good of others. But love is also practical – it's not the kind of cotton wool love but one that encourages, the one that rubs your knee when you fall off a bike and tells you to get back on it, be more careful and runs alongside you. Love that encourages us to take risks and challenges us – a love that wants the best for us, and wants us to reach our goals. God's love for us is never ending, it heals, encourages, offers hope and forgiveness. Cont.,

This is the love that we are called to offer. At times it can be really easy and a joy; but at other times its challenging and extremely difficult.

Hospitality, welcome and fellowship are ways the church responds to its neighbours. Sunday mornings are the central focus with worship and a time of fellowship afterwards, but our church is also the place where we welcome the families and young children to BBT on a Monday morning, and we gather as friends in the afternoon for games, conversation, and friends at More. Our zoom services offer an opportunity for those not able to join us, and for them to still feel part of our church life. Our church is also a place where we welcome people from the community for funerals, weddings and baptisms; we offer them a place of love and prayer as we journey alongside them in their moments of grief but also celebration.

We actually never know who is going to walk through our doors. I was reminded of this twice this Christmas. During the Christmas tree festival, I met a lady who had lost her children and seeing the trees and just being present in the church had helped. On Christmas Day a man sat in a pew and wept throughout the service, afterwards he said, I dread Christmas but I knew here I can be myself, I'm not going to be judged and I'm not alone.

I hope this month you are reminded of the love God has for you and as a church and Christian family, may we continue to work together to demonstrate God's perfect love to all.

The Sistine Madonna by Raphael (The picture in the Guild Room)



I've been doing a bit of research into the picture we have in the Guild Room on the chimney breast. It's a copy of The Sistine Madonna painted by Raphael and the original hangs in Dresden in the Old Masters Picture Gallery. The work measures over 2.5 metres high and almost 2 metres wide so it's a very big painting. It was commissioned by Pope Julius 11 in 1512 for the church of San Sisto, Piacenza and the painting was one of the last Madonna's painted by Raphael. As such it is known as a very important painting. It was relocated in 1754 to Dresden after being purchased by Augustus 111 of Poland and remained there until the second world war.

It was rescued from destruction during the bombing of Dresden in World War II, The painting was said to be stored, with other works of art, in a tunnel in Saxon Switzerland. Considering the size of the painting and the weight of the frame this must have been quite a feat!

The painting was taken from there to Russia by the Russian Red Army in 1946 and went temporarily on restricted exhibition in the Pushkin, along with some of the other treasures the Soviets had retrieved.

It was then transported in a box on a tented flatcar to Moscow.

But in 1955, after the death of Joseph Stalin, the Soviets decided to return the art to Germany, "for the purpose of strengthening and furthering the progress of friendship between the Soviet and German peoples."

It has been in Dresden ever since.

A prominent element within the painting, the winged angels beneath Mary are famous in their own right. The angels of this nature are known as <u>putti</u>, As early as 1913 <u>Gustav Kobbé</u> declared that "no cherub or group of cherubs is so famous as the two that lean on the altar top indicated at the very bottom of the picture." Heavily marketed, they have been featured in stamps, postcards, T-shirts, socks, and wrapping paper. These putti have inspired legends of their own. According to a 1912 article in *Fra Magazine*, when Raphael was painting the *Madonna* the children of his model would come in to watch. Struck by their posture as they did, the story goes, he added them to the painting exactly as he saw them.

Yes - 17 No - 5

This vote indicated an overwhelming majority for us as a church to allow same-sex marriages to be conducted on our premises. However, we appreciate that whilst those on the church council have been given authority by the wider church to discern the way forward regarding church life; we felt further discussions with the wider church on how they felt was important.

On Sunday 20th February we will be discussing, thinking, listening and praying about the God In Love Unites us report that has been produced by the Methodist Church on this subject and discerning together where we are at. Please do join us at the usual worship time for these important conversations which will form part of our worship that morning.

During the last two years, we have experienced a seismic trauma as a society as we have lived with the Covid pandemic. The resulting lockdowns and restrictions have had a huge impact on our lives, the communities in which we live and our churches. It is a time of deep uncertainty, added to which those who lead are feeling exhausted and worn out. During the summer, the District Policy Committee formulated the areas of work that we feel are priorities for our resource and energies. These were approved at our Autumn Synod and are as follows: To Nurture lay leaders To Grow new ways of being church To Cultivate just communities We are very conscious of not adding to the burden of already weary people; instead we have viewed these priorities as a way of enabling churches and circuits to discern their future mission.
