As we join together as a nation to celebrate the many and various acts of service made by our Queen, it is good to reflect upon the nature of that service and the example that it provides to us all.

Much of what the Queen promised at her coronation 70 years ago related to words of power, law and justice, but when we reflect on her 70 years of service, these are not the words that often come to my mind.

When I think about how I see the Queen go about her acts of service to her nation I am often struck by how small each individual act seems and yet, together they add up to the job of being the Queen.

So much of the Queen's reign is caught her in her smile. As she goes about the country meeting the people, the Queen is always quick to smile. She cares, she listens and she takes the time to be attentive. For a lady in her 96th year her mind and outlook on life is far younger. She has grown in her awareness of the world, and travelled with the changing world, making her have a modern outlook on life. The Queen has the gift to relate to all ages. She doesn't just dismiss things because its not how it used to be. What a fantastic example this is to each of us.

Her faith though is for me a real inspiration. Like all families things haven't always been easy. There have been disagreements, illness, tragic deaths and concerns. Throughout it all her faith has remained strong. The Queen prays daily, seeks the counsel of her minister and attends church weekly. Over all the years I spent with Nan, I watched her shine a light of joy and love into the lives of all who knew her.

I saw her talk to people she didn't know and share the same kindness as if they were old friends. I heard Nan sing a song for every occasion and find a unique phrase for almost every situation to make life that little bit brighter. Every phrase I remember still makes me smile..

I heard Nan keep her loved ones alive in the stories she told and watched her take on life with a vigour and spirit that would not be beaten, no matter what she faced. This is this same person, who lived over half her life with a hole in her heart, who lived through a war and lived through losing the people closest to her. Maybe she lived so brightly, for them.

-I could see God's holy spirit in Nan. -One of her favourite poems of faith was 'Footprints in the sand' by Carolyn Joyce Carty. The last verse reads:

The Lord replied, "My precious, precious child, I love you and would never leave you.. When you see only one set of footprints, it was then that I carried you."

Not only did Nan live lifted by the spirit, but she used her strength to lift the hearts of others too. Nan knew she was blessed, even through hardship. She still saw every day with a laugh, a smile and a love to share with all around her. This was one of the greatest lessons I ever learnt from Nan, to know, no matter what, you are blessed.

The most important lesson—was from the way in which Nancy Green loved—unconditionally. Without expectation, without end. Nancy Green has left her legacy of love in us, her family, her friends. If you were loved by Nancy Green, you are loved always.

SYNOD

The Spring Synod for the Chester & Stoke on Trent District took place at Helsby Methodist Church on Saturday 7th May. The church was easy to find, as it was just on the edge of the village/town and on the main A56 and just below Helsby Hill. The worship area is modern compared to ours at St. John's. It was built in the 1960s with the comfortable chairs arranged in a V shape, attached was a room with an open kitchen/serving area. The old Church is still used for various meetings and lettings. This building looked quite rundown from the outside.

The main theme of the day was to do with Climate Change. This was led by a Connexional Officer, Rev. David Hardman. I had come across him before as an Officer of Christian Aid. We were also joined remotely by Martha Rand, Youth President of the Methodist Church. A lot of conversations took place on becoming an Eco Church and how individuals can contribute to reducing our carbon emissions. Some suggestions put forward was having a Jumper Sunday, with no heat, with the response by one person (not me!) was every Sunday is a Jumper Sunday in our church! Another was, why has the Methodist Church Connexionally not negotiated fuel contracts, because as a church this would command greater buying power. David noted this, watch this space.

The Synod was informed that conversations were taking place with other Districts in the North West Region, as changes to Districts need to be implemented due to the shrinkage of churches. We were informed that we would hear more on this at the Autumn Synod. We were introduced to the Rev. David Willis, who is the District Mission Enabler and Robin Perry, the new District Digital Enabler.

The two new members to the District team could be quite useful to us at St. John's.

Rev. David has moved into the Crewe Manse, so is not far away and Robin is a Local Preacher in Market Drayton and is the son of the Rev. Edna and Ivan Perry, who have recently joined us. I also found out that the Connexion is not sending out any printed material. Connexional staff have to justify using cars for travel and not public transport.

As a Church, thanks to Helen Trigg, we have begun the process of becoming an Eco Church, albeit being in the early stages. As part of this, we have agreed to include Climate Change in our Worship at least once a quarter. On Sunday 26th June, Rev. Jim Needham has offered to lead one of these services.

We all know fuels costs have greatly increased. This has a serious financial effect for our church. Should we be reducing the heat in the building? Do we meet in the schoolrooms in the winter? I try to not use all the lights when in the building, this does bring criticism. It disturbs me to find lights left on all night and going into church to see every light on, when only a small area is being used. The light switches are all numbered, with a list at the side to say which they are. We all need to take responsibility to reduce our carbon footprint.

Jubilee Celebrations

To begin Whitchurch's celebration of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, the Whitchurch Business Group (WBG) have organised a torch-lit procession from St. Alkmund's to the Rugby Club where a beacon will be lit.

The aim is to gather in St. Alkmund's car park at 8pm on the 2nd June. I will then lead everyone to the Rugby club whilst carrying the torch to light the beacon. The walk is short and boots are not required. Families are welcome but there will be fireworks, so maybe leave the dog at home.
