Message from the Manse



Hello friends,

As we unfurl ourselves and make our way outside, May is often a time when we can celebrate simple pleasures, bare feet on grass, the sun warming your face, a bit of time to ourselves. For our teenagers its often a time of study and examinations, but the end is in sight.

Summer is often a time of restoration and relaxation with time to explore our hobbies and interests helped by the increased light levels and access to outdoor spaces and it all starts on May 1st.



May Day is the ancient festival marking the start of summer, which is often celebrated with the crowning of a May Queen and dancing around a maypole. This year however we will be celebrating with the coronation of King Charles III and the Queen Consort Camilla on the slightly later date of the 6th May.

On her coronation in Westminster Abbey on 2nd June 1953, the late Queen Elizabeth II made promises before the congregation and before God that she would serve her country and those she governed, and towards the end of the ceremony she said "The things which I have here before promised, I will perform and keep. So help me God." The faith of the Queen was well recorded and despite the privilege of her position I have no doubt that at times she earnestly needed the help of God to keep the oaths she had made. A life of service can't always be easy, especially one lived in the spotlight.

This coronation is the first opportunity for many of us to witness this ancient ceremony. Using the oil of Chrism pressed from Olives from the Mount of Olives in Jerusalem, the Archbishop of Canterbury will perform the anointing, a duty which has been undertaken by the holder of the post since 1066. It seems fitting that the new King will be anointed with fruits of the earth he has been campaigning to protect for over 50 years. It has been widely documented that he is passionate about the environment, sustainability, organic farming and halting deforestation. He is also an advocate of young people, founding the Prince's Trust. He is a patron of the Arts and is a published author himself, showing a creative spirit, and is passionate about inclusion in our multi-cultural Britain. Charles III is also a man of faith, like his mother, our late Queen, his life is underpinned by a belief not in his own human Kingship but in the Kingship of Jesus Christ.

Jesus was the Servant King, who encouraged the young, spoke up for the marginalised and served those who were 'outsiders' in society. Jesus was the King who, at the beginning of time saw creation in its new and perfect state and weeps as we spoil it. Jesus is the King who died for those he came to serve and rose again so that we could have life everlasting. Jesus is the King who is forever the bridge by which we can one day be with God. Perhaps, by working to protect the environment, encouraging the young and speaking up for the marginalised, our new King is seeking to live out his faith by following in the footsteps of Jesus, but through it he will need the help of God, like we all do in our journey of faith.

That weekend, there is sure to be a lot of pomp and ceremony, the traditional balcony photo and perhaps a glass or two raised to the new King. In Whitchurch we have a joint service at St. Alkmund's and a whole host of events in the community planned and lots of celebrating.

Celebration is a wonderful expression of joy and community, it's not always expressed on a national level - most often it's personal or family-sized. But with each celebration there is an outpouring of happiness and a desire to share time with those important to us and mark it in some way.

So, aside from the coronation celebration what will you be celebrating this May? The warmer days? The delights of a garden heading into summer? A family wedding or a long-anticipated holiday? Are you an open water swimmer just waiting to peel off the wetsuit or a painter longing for blue skies and blousy blooms? We each have our own celebrations, some grand and some less so.

So whether you are celebrating the crowning of our King, the wedding day you'll never forget or the arrival of your first home grown tomato, enjoy the moments, record them and share them as we stroll into summer and the new Carolean era*.

However, this is not the case as Judy Bellingham, who does the ordering, is keen to continue and to find other fair trade suppliers of goods we can sell on the stall and the other church reps are keen to sell those goods.

We are asking that you continue to buy from us to support the hard-hit farmers and artisans who produced goods for Traidcraft and who will now be trying to sell their goods via different fair trade companies. You can either buy from the market stall on Fridays or when the stall comes to your church on a Sunday.

Christian Aid Week is 14th-20th May this year

Gifts will help farmers in Malawi plant better seeds, secure a fairer price for their crops and build happier futures for their children. During Cyclone Freddy, Malawi experienced a year's worth of rain during the 4-week cyclone. Floods have washed away crops, over 500,000 people have been displaced and hundreds have lost their lives. $\pounds10$ could pay for a 2kg bag of seeds to plant pigeon peas – a hardy, drought-resistant crop to help families build back as the flood water recedes.

The Churches Together **Christian Aid service** will take place on **Sunday 14th May** at 10.30am. It will be hosted by Beacon Church at the Watergate Centre. There will be envelopes at St. John's for your gifts and you can place these in the collection at St. John's or the Beacon.

And we will be leading an Assembly at Whitchurch Junior Academy during the week.

A District Zoom meeting took place in March with representatives from churches that have registered an interest in becoming an Eco Church.

No one from St. John's was able to join, so I asked Rob Glassonbury, who is District Administrator and PA to Revd. Helen Kirk and convened the meeting, to summarise what happened.

He said "We had a good meeting with 26 Zoom windows. Much of the time was in breakout rooms, so people could discuss what they already do and what extra help they think the district could provide. Each of the groups reported back similar things, such as solar panel installations, being green with toilet rolls, cleaning products, reducing plastic, efficient lighting and heating, and replicating such things at home.

It was recognised there is no quick fix, and churches are implementing things as and when they can. We hope to have another Zoom in June or July to see how people are doing. If there's anything you think the district can help with, we'll be pleased to hear. "
