Message from the Manse

April 2023

Hello friends,



The beginning of April, this year, also marks the beginning of Holy Week, the culmination of the previous five weeks of preparation that is Lent. During Holy Week we re-enact the highs and lows of the key events in the last days of the life of Jesus. We ride into Jerusalem on a donkey whilst the crowds gather and wave their palm branches and shout Hosanna. We gather around the Passover table as Jesus washes the feet of his disciples and shares with them the very first bread and wine. We sit and wait with Jesus in the garden as he prays to his Father one last time. Then we gather at the foot of the cross to watch as Jesus is put to death once and for all. On Holy Saturday we wait- as Jesus' disciples waited for the chance to serve the body of Jesus in the tomb, we wait. Then early on Easter morning before it is quite light, we gather and witness the empty tomb and celebrate our encounter with the risen Christ.

Each of these acts takes us deeper into the story and experience of Jesus and His disciples and each time we rehearse it we learn and experience something new. It also stands in somewhat stark contrast with the Easter celebrated by the world. As with Christmas where we wait for Christmas day to celebrate, and endure 6 weeks of Lent before we eat an easter egg. The rest of society seem to have Christmas celebrations from the beginning of November and the eggs on sale from Boxing Day. I have learnt from bitter experience that waiting until Easter to buy your Easter eggs and chocolate means that you are more than likely to be limited in your choice- being left with only the most weird and wonderful and frankly disgusting combinations to choose from. And of course, by Easter Monday it is all gone, and the shelves will be full of something else- this year probably coronation flags and union jack decorated cakes.

This can make those of us who keep Easter in this way feel disconnected from the culture in which we live. This disconnection is an increasingly familiar feeling. There have always been generational divides, but the fast-ever-changing technological world can make these divides seem deeper and wider. I recently watched the first Mission Impossible movie with William, filmed in 1996 – William was surprised it wasn't in black and white!

At the time of release, I remember that we marvelled at the amazing technology, watches that could take a phone call, ear buds that fitted in your ears with no wires, phones that could track someone's every movement. Imagine that! Well- I don't need to as I use all of those things every day now. What was pure fantasy just a few years ago has become my everyday reality.

When we feel disconnected from the culture around us it can be tempting to lock ourselves into our bubble and reject the changes, by doing this, though we risk pushing away connection and people, but also God too. As society changes we have to hold firm to what is true and important but keep ourselves open to the opportunities for connection, to seek for what is real and can enrich our lives. We have to remember that God is still as much active today as he was in years gone by, and he might be showing and revealing to us more about what his kingdom looks like and how we need to change and be more willing to adapt as seek to serve and worship God in our world today.
