Message from the Manse



Hello friends,

Each year I look forward to seeing Christmas ads on TV for the first time and as soon as I saw this year's John Lewis commercial online I loved it straight away. For those of you who haven't seen it a boy buys a seed from a second-hand sale believing it to be from a kit for "planting a perfect Christmas tree". He plants it, and it grows into a Venus flytrap. The plant happily grows in the corner of the living room until it tries to eat the boy's dog, table lamp and furnishings, so his family throws it out into the garden. The family replace the Venus flytrap with a traditional Christmas tree whilst the rejected plant looks in through the patio doors, its trap shaped leaf face squished up against the glass in longing. The little boy reaches out to his flytrap friend, taking a beautifully wrapped present out to the garden and then his family, inspired by kindness, do the same. The Venus flytrap eats the presents, then regurgitates them back up and spits them at the family, helpfully unwrapped.

On the face of it this is a rather unusual Christmas advert - it's not sentimental, cosy or sparkly. It features a giant present eating plant that almost ruins Christmas. But if you look a little deeper I think it has something very profound and honest to say about our annual festivities. A clue can be found in the backing track, a song especially written for this advert, with Andrea Bocelli theatrically repeating the lyrics 'la vita è una festa', meaning 'life is a celebration'.

The Methodist Churches 2023 Christmas campaign is called "Out of the ordinary" and this advert is certainly that! But it reminds us that in the everyday, in the ordinary and not so ordinary there is still an opportunity for love and kindness to shared and for God's presence to be known.

The first Christmas wasn't exactly ordinary either. It was the first year that a decree was sent out for everyone to return to their home town to fill in a census. It was not ordinary for a bright star to align with planets in the night sky, which is why it drew the attention of the wise men to follow it to where it would lead. It was not ordinary for a woman to give birth in a stable, and for the first visitors to be the wild outcast shepherds from the hills. Gifts of Frankincense, Gold and Myrrh aren't exactly ordinary gifts for a baby. And it was certainly not ordinary for a King, let alone the Son of God, to be born in such humble dwellings. There was nothing sentimental, cosy or sparkly about this Christmas Day.

But out of ordinary people, Mary and Joseph, became God's most precious gift to us. Jesus, the Christ child, born in extra-ordinary circumstances to show us God's great love for us. And in that moment, the gift of life was truly a celebration.

In the advert, the gift of the plant, the life that came from the seed, was rejected. It didn't act, look or do what a Christmas tree is supposed to do. It didn't fit in. In fact, it made a right mess and risked ruining the plans that people had in place for the "perfect Christmas". So it was dragged outside, into the cold and shunned.

When you think about the life of Jesus, this is exactly what the world did to him. They didn't want their world to be turned upside down; they didn't want to accept something different; Jesus was not the kind of king that they were looking for and they certainly didn't want to accept his message of love for the outcast and the stranger. And so they dragged him out of the gates of Jerusalem and away from the city.

But the plant was not forgotten. The little boy, went out to it, and gave it a gift. He doesn't forget it. And through his compassion and kindness, the family do the same.

We live in a world that says to us that we need X Y and Z to be happy, to have the perfect life etc. And Christmas, if we are not careful, is the worse time for this. We want everything to be perfect, and everything to look nice. But if we are not careful we can lose sight of what that time of year is all about. If we aren't careful, we can get so caught up in the tinsel and trimmings that we end up putting Jesus, his stinky stable and his odd and weird guests out in the cold.

The plant may not have been what we were expecting, it certainly didn't do what it was supposed to with the gifts it was offered to sit under it. But Jesus the Christ child was not what we were expecting either.

Life is a celebration, eternal life has been gifted in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. God loves us all, no matter what, whether we are ordinary or not, just like the little boy, who loved his perfect Christmas tree despite it not being ordinary. So don't leave Jesus out in the cold this Christmas, don't reject the stranger or a different way of doing things, put aside the things that distract us, invite them in and experience the true meaning of Christmas that lies beneath the wrapping papers and in the words of Andrea Bocelli, remember, 'la vita è una festa' - 'life is a celebration'.
