Message from the Manse



Dear Friends

Many years ago when I first became interested in the Church I was worried by the differences in the resurrection accounts.

In some gospels the women at the tomb just see angels, whilst in others they meet the risen Christ. In some the disciples meet Jesus that evening in Jerusalem in others they are told to return to Galilee to meet him.

Writing to the church in Corinth less than 20 years after the events and some 10 years before the first gospel was written, Paul doesn't mention the women, but does say that Jesus appeared to the apostles and then some 500 of his followers. In the book of Acts and later church history we read how rejection, persecution and martyrdom was often the fate of these early believers. I really can't think they would have endured that for what they knew to be a dodgy and made up story.

If we were writing about an event from many years ago I think we would all stress different things and some details would get a bit jumbled together. Back in the 1980's I went off on a motorbike riding around Europe, yet in all my memories I'm riding on the left hand side of the road....!

It must also have been difficult to talk about the resurrection because the disciples had no similar experiences and words. Jesus had invited people to touch him, he ate with them,

but he could walk through walls, appear and disappear at will.

Resurrection is essentially mystery and beyond comprehension.

If the resurrection was a delusion or wishful thinking I think the church would have made sure the stories were the same, it's the variety and the struggle to find adequate language that for me nowadays makes them authentic.

The risen Jesus promised to send the Holy Spirit to be with his followers and many Christians both today and over the centuries have spoken of the feeling that they were not alone and that Jesus was with them.

Perhaps when we look back over our lives we can see how we have been supported, guided, strengthened in times of joy and sorrow.

So my belief in the Easter story is based on three things, the Bible, the experience of the Church and my own life experiences. In that sense faith is like a three legged stool stable on uneven surfaces! A stool is not an ornament but something to sit on and faith has consequences. The apostles took the Jesus story all over the ancient world, Peter went to Rome, Thomas to India, Paul to the Greek cities, but whilst I don't think we need to grab our passports and become missionaries, we do though need to think about our priorities and lifestyle.

The big issues of the world may be beyond us, but we can speak of hope, we can try to be loving, kind, generous and compassionate, we can support and encourage those who may be in a position to do greater good. Cont.,

We have the three legged stool of Bible, Church and our experiences, but we can't just sit back comfortably when the world around is a mess.

So what then is there that is "ours to say and to do"?
