Message from the Manse



Hello friends,

It's great to be back amongst you all and catching up with what has been happening. A huge thank you to those who have supported the continuing ministry in my churches whilst I have been away.

I thought I would share with you a little bit about my sabbatical. I'll share more I'm sure over the weeks and months ahead but thought I would give you the

highlights as such!

My sabbatical began with a bit of bump to be honest, just a few days before it began, I tripped over in the front garden, falling on my left knee and hitting my face against the wall. The bruising was quite extensive and I had pulled my back. This meant I started my sabbatical having no choice but to rest and recover. As frustrating as I found this, it was certainly what I needed both because of the fall but also because it was only when I stopped, I realised just how tired I was.

After recovering and resting, my sabbatical real-

ly truly began. The highlight was my trip to Ireland. I started off in Belfast and then travelled around the coast following the Wild Atlantic coastline. I travelled all the way round, finishing off in Dublin. The views and landscape are stunning, and I immersed myself in the local culture and history. I visited pilgrim sites, Celtic burial places and monuments, and many spiritual and holy places. Visiting the book of Kells in Dublin was a fascinating experience, and Glendalough in County Wicklow felt like a very thin place and spiritual.

My theme for the sabbatical was to look at communion, and in particular Celtic worship styles, and having opportunities to explore this has been beneficial. God though had ideas too, and I found myself led to discovering more about the Irish famine and the stories of emigration. A strong theme of what it means to be in community and communion with others came to mind, and I reflected on biblical stories that held the same theme. My own family ancestry comes from Ireland so the stories of migration did resonate with me. I will certainly be exploring this in worship in the coming months.

I also had a really inspiring visit to Liverpool Cathedral to see the Threads through the Bible exhibition by Jacqui Parkinson; a trip to York Minister to look at the stained-glass window displays and an amazing two week stay in Northumbria, with a weekend stay on Lindisfarne Island at Easter.

Having the time to rest, travel, be creative and spend time with my family has really been a blessing. Coming back, I feel I have gained some inspiration and knowledge to enhance worship as well as my ministry. I am also determined to ensure a better work life balance and to stop and notice the everyday blessings we have. I really hope I can hold onto some of the things that have really strengthened me during this time.

Summer is a time when most of us have a bit of a break and a time of rest, holidays and lazy days. But before we know it September is here and things can soon get very busy, especially in church life. When the To-do list is ever growing it can be hard to ensure that we have a balance between the things we have to do and the things that we want to do. And it can feel like we are always in a rush.

Believe it or not, I ended my sabbatical having another fall – I tripped over on the cobbles in York, and ended up having to take a few days rest again. Both times I fell over because I was rushing. Rushing to get things done and rushing to fit everything in. Rushing gets us nowhere really. We can miss things and, in many ways, life passes by even quicker and we

<u>Shropshire Historic Churches Trust Ride & Stride</u> <u>Event</u>

Once again, we have registered St John's with the SHCT fund raising event, **Ride & Stride** which this year takes place on **Saturday 13th September**, as part of Heritage Weekend.

This is a 3-pronged event.

1.) The church opens to visitors from 10am to 6pm with people manning it through the day. Visitors will come from across the county (and neighbouring ones) either walking, cycling, or riding horses **or in a car,** to as many churches/chapels as they can manage.

2.) Members of the church can Ride or Stride between as many churches/chapels as they are able in the time.3.) Participants (Riders, Striders and church sitters etc.) obtain as much sponsorship as possible. It is possible to Gift Aid which is a valued extra.

So, if you would like a morning or afternoon driving round beautiful Shropshire countryside, and raising funds from sponsorship at the same time, then this is your chance. After the event, all the Sponsor money is collected up and sent to the SHCT. The treasurer will then send 50% back to the nominated church/chapel ie. St. John's.

Anyone who is interested in being sponsored for walking or riding (a bike, a horse or in a car) round as many open churches/chapels as they can, please ask Chris Crowther for more information .
