going—especially as the darker nights draw in.

Sitting in our dining room wondering what I'm going to produce, I can't help but notice the photos on the walls. They are a record of some fifty years and start with our second daughter's baptism. In the picture as well as ourselves and Kirstie our elder daughter are our great friends Pat and Peter. Pat was Morag's Godmother and fully carried out the promises made at the service.

We had arrived in Billericay in September 1970 and looking for a church had followed the sign in the High Street to the Methodist Church. What a welcome, "Doc" - Rev David Dunn - Wilson nobbled us at the door as we were leaving, called over the Steward of the day who on hearing where we were living introduced us to Peter and Pat. Thus was formed a lasting friendship despite our moving around the country.

Peter has suffered great personal tragedy losing Pat to cancer and his son Matthew killed climbing in the Alps. His other son Simon, who has huge learning difficulties, has' as an adult, been in sheltered accommodation for a number of years. Peter's faith is amazing and the church has proved to be a real "God Send" in that he met Denise there and after some time they were happily married.

Harking back to the warm welcome we received at the church in Billericay, I think it is good to see that St John's must have a welcoming atmosphere as proved by a few examples recently of new people coming to church. Long may it continue.

And hurls for him, O half hurls earth for him off under his feet.



# **Clayton Health Centre**




