Message from the Manse

Hello Friends



November is a month of remembrance — a time when we honour those who gave their lives in war, and when we also look around our world today and long for peace.

As I write this the news has just been shared that a ceasefire agreement between Israel and Hamas has happened. For now, brings a halt to the immediate hostilities in the middle east. Humanitarian access is being scaled up, aid convoys are preparing to enter and processes for hostage and prisoner exchanges are underway.

While this is deeply welcome news for many, we must remember that ceasefires can be fragile; the pause in violence does not immediately resolve the root causes of suffering, displacement, grief, injustice, or trauma. Even in a truce, civilians bear the scars of conflict — loss of homes, infrastructure, health, and community. The work of rebuilding trust, reconciliation, law, protection, and dignity is long, risky, and dependent on both political will and human compassion.

My prayer is that as you read this, some two weeks after writing that things have continued to remain calm and as the people and communities rebuild themselves, lasting peace is feeling much more achievable.

The situation in Gaza reminds us that while

wars may pause, the pain and rebuilding carry on. Innocent lives — in the past and in the present — are always at the heart of conflict.

As we enter November, our hearts are drawn to the theme of peace — not simply as a wish, but as a calling. In a world torn by conflict, uncertainty, and suffering, we are reminded again of Christ's work as the "Prince of Peace" (Isaiah 9:6) and His invitation to live peacefully with all (Romans 12:18).

As followers of Jesus we aren't just to pray for peace but to embody it, every day. And this isn't always easy I know, but if we hold onto those virtues of Christ – love, compassion, understanding and forgiveness, then we can resolve issues much more calmly and peacefully. That does not mean of course that we don't stand up for what is right. Just because we are Christians doesn't not mean that we should allow mistreatment or unjust situations to happen. We are not called to offer complacent peace but rather we are to be courageous peacemakers.

So, what can we do as a community?

1. Remember with Gratitude

Let's honour the past not just with silence, but with action: by being people who value peace, understanding, and compassion in our everyday lives.

2. Stay Informed and Open

Conflicts around the world are complex — including the situation in Gaza and Israel. Taking time to listen, learn, and understand helps us move beyond division and towards empathy.

3. Support Relief Efforts

Give, if you can, to trusted aid organisations deliver-

ing food, shelter, and medical care to those in need.

4. Come Together

This year we again join as churches together at the war memorial and then with our friends at St Alkmunds for a service to mark the Remembrance Sunday reflections.

"Peace is not something you wish for; it's something you make" — *John Lennon*

As we wear our poppies, light candles, and gather this month, let's carry that message with us — that peace begins in how we treat each other, care for the vulnerable, and respond to the world around us. With blessings,

Good News and Wide Smiles!

We recently had some good news about the tower clock working again but unfortunately as I am writing we are having more problems with the clock stopping and starting. I hope we can have a more permanent solution soon but I'll keep you posted on that.

On the theme of good news, I attended the Inner Wheel International Rally at Lilleshall recently and I'd like to share with you a little bit about the charities the Inner Wheel is supporting around the world. We arrived at around 10am and enjoyed a coffee and browsed the stalls before the presentations began at 11 am. Here's a brief overview;

Glads House: Mombasa, Kenya. This charity supports the street kids of Mombasa through 'safe spaces'. Protecting the kids and often their families and providing educational support and an opportunity to engage in sport, often football or boxing. This encourages their physical and psychological wellbeing. Lovely wide smiles from these children playing football on screen were such a joy to see.

ChildAid: A charity based in London. They support children in Moldova, Belarus and Ukraine. Providing education, healthcare and reunit-

ing families who have been misplaced.

Teams4U: Annual Christmas Shoeboxes distribution program. They distribute to, Georgia, Moldova, Belarus, Romania & Bosnia, 60,000 Christmas Shoe Boxes were handed out in 2024. The wide smiles on the faces of these children as they opened their shoeboxes from the UK were just lovely.

Intercare: Helps to redirect unused medical supplies to Africa where they are needed. These go to schools, hospitals, health centres and orphanages. They send only what is needed so constant liaising with different areas in Africa takes place before shipment. Examples of the achievements were shown on film.

Purple Community Fund: They run their own education and mentoring, livelihood and skills training in the very poor areas of the Philippines. They had an amazing display of recycled jewellery, bags and purses on their stall, all using ring pulls from drinks cans. They also recycle tyres into footwear and wellingtons. They showed a lot of what they do on film, accompanied a joyful children's choir.

The Inner Wheel also helps a lot of groups in the local community in and around Whitchurch but too many for this letter.

I'm proud to play a very small part in this support as a member of the Inner Wheel and I know that in serving the community, both near and far, I'm serving the Lord.

1870

From Wye Cliff to Pont Faen. Miss Child in great force. She showed me her clever drawings of horses and told me the adventures of the brown wood owl 'Ruth' which she took home from here (Clyro, Herefordshire) last year. She wanted to call the owl 'Eve' but Mrs Bridge said it should be called 'Ruth'.

She and her sister stranded in London at night went to London Bridge hotel (having missed the last train) with little money and no luggage except the owl in a basket. The owl hooted all night in spite of putting it up the chimney, before the looking glass, under the bedclothes, and in a circle of lighted candles which they hoped it would mistake for the sun.

The owl went on hooting, upset the basket, got out and flew about the room. The chambermaid almost frightened to death dared not come inside the door. Miss Child asked the waiter to get some mice for 'Ruth' but none could be got!
